The Bachelor of Arts in Music program, and the three streams of the newly innovated Bachelor of Music program, allow students to foster their own unique musical identities by providing opportunities to explore Classical, Contemporary, and Sonic Arts/Music Production courses. Queen's students in any program can enrol for credit in music courses, including lessons and ensembles. DAN School students benefit from small class sizes, individual attention, and become part of a tight-knit and engaged community.

### BACHELOR OF MUSIC (BMUS)

Allows students with a range of interests and experiences to explore the many facets of music production, performance, education, and entrepreneurship to prepare for an exciting career in the arts and cultural industries. Students are admitted to this direct-entry program through individualized auditions.

### BACHELOR OF ARTS in MUSIC

(BAH/BA) is a liberal arts focused degree that allows students to combine courses in music performance and music studies with others in a range of Arts and Science disciplines. Students seek admission to Arts/Sci and then select their concentration (Music) at the end of their first year.

### GET THE COURSES YOU NEED

In first year you will have the chance to explore the foundations of Music along with some electives. Courses will vary based on your interest and stream, such as Classical, Contemporary, and Sonic Arts/Music Production. For BMus students, some courses will be pre-loaded for you.

Attend Majors Night in the Winter term to learn more about Plan options.

Interested in getting a head start in learning and working in a digital world? Take [ASCX 150](#) and develop future-ready skills!

Explore the discipline of Music, while considering a minor and/or certificate such as [Entrepreneurship and Innovation certificate](#). Learn more about [Certificates](#) and [Internship](#) options.

Consider enrolling in a Drama (DRAM) or Music/Theatre (MUTH) course to broaden your knowledge of the Arts.

Develop your entrepreneurial skills by participating in the [Dean's Changemaker Challenge](#) (ASCX 200/300).

Third year is a chance to really focus on the subject areas that most interest you or to explore a broader selection of topics in Music. Meet with a [DAN School Academic Advisor](#) to make sure you are on track and have planned out your courses for next year.

In fourth year you will have the chance to participate in research-based courses that can lead to [Graduate School](#) or to your future career path.

Make sure to finish up all your courses for your major and your optional minor and/or certificate(s).

Interested in working on a real-world problem with an actual client? Take [ASCX 400](#) and develop your consulting and project-management skills.

### GET RELEVANT EXPERIENCE

Join teams or clubs on campus such as [Queen's Bands](#), [Queen's Musical Theatre](#), and [QUSMEA](#).

Attend concerts, masterclasses, and workshops. Check out events at [The Isabel](#) and the [Grand Theatre](#).

Talk to Career Services about summer jobs through [SWEP](#) or [Work-Study](#).

Think about applying to positions in student services or the [Alma Mater Society](#). Volunteer at local schools through approved programs.

Position yourself for performance and scholarship competitions. Contact professors about grading, research, and teaching assistant positions. Consider investigating a summer internship position for credit. Play in a pit band for one of Queen's music theatre groups. If interested, apply for an [Undergraduate Student Summer Research Fellowship \(USSRF\)](#).

Investigate requirements for full-time jobs or other opportunities related to careers of interest.

Assess what experience you're lacking and fill in gaps with volunteering, clubs, or internships – check out the Career Services skills [workshop](#) for help.

### GET CONNECTED WITH THE COMMUNITY

Take private instrumental or vocal lessons for credit in any year of the program. Queen's students who are experienced singers or instrumentalists are also invited to audition to take private lessons. Additional fees may be required.

Connect with different community organizations such as [Queen's Musical Theatre](#), [QWave](#), and [QUSMEA](#).

Explore volunteer options in the community, at such places as [The Isabel](#), [Kingston Symphony](#), or the [H'art Centre](#).

Audition for performance opportunities in the Kingston community, such as bands, pit bands, shows, ensembles, and choral groups.

Do targeted networking with alumni working in careers of interest by joining the LinkedIn group [Queen's Connects](#). Check out Career Services [networking workshops](#).

Connect with professors at events or workshops.

Consider joining professional associations like [SOCAN](#), [CFMTA](#), [SEM](#), [ORMTA](#), [MusCan](#), [AMS](#), and the [SMT](#).

### GET THINKING GLOBALLY

Explore courses in global musics, inter-cultural arts, music and gender and Indigenous musical traditions.

Is an exchange in your future? Start thinking about where you would like to [study abroad](#). Apply in January for a third-year exchange through the [International Programs Office](#).

Prepare for work in a multicultural environment by taking QUIC's Intercultural Competency Certificate.

Speak to a QUIC advisor to get involved in their programs, events, and training opportunities.

International students interested in staying in Canada can speak with an [International Student Advisor](#).

Explore non-music elective courses that complement your degree and offer education in intercultural competencies, such as courses in Development Studies, Black Studies, Languages, etc.

### GET READY FOR LIFE AFTER GRADUATION

In any year of your studies, make an appointment to meet with the DAN School Undergraduate Program and Events Coordinator and Student Advisor.

A degree in Music can equip you with:

- Music creation and curation
- Digital creation, editing, and mixing, use of sound equipment
- Understanding and analyzing a variety of musics: contemporary, historical, local, and global
- High level performance on an instrument
- Teaching skills such as band/choral/orchestral techniques, conducting, and leadership for classroom, individual lesson, and community-based teaching
- Reading analysis, and writing skills
- Increased working memory and IQ leading to improved pattern recognition, memorization, and improvisation
- Ability to adapt to new or changing situations
- Oral communication for confident public speaking
- Presentation, performance skills, and stage presence
- Creative and critical thinking
- Ability to work independently or as a team
- Self-discipline and time management

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### CLASSICAL

For students interested in grounding their music careers in solo classical, chamber, choral, opera, concert band or orchestral music, the Classical stream has been broadened to include digital creation and production, and entrepreneurial skills.

### CONTEMPORARY INSTRUMENTAL AND VOCAL GENRES

Allows students interested in musical theatre, cabaret, pop, jazz, rock, folk, or fiddling to approach their study of music from any of these areas, with a focus on developing skills in contemporary musicianship including performance, arranging, creation, digital production, and entrepreneurship.

### SONIC ARTS & MUSIC PRODUCTION

This stream is for students interested in sound design, music-based performance art, and/or digital music creation, production, recording, and composition across all genres (including beat-, sample-, and loop-based music).
