Why GRADUATE STUDIES in POLITICAL STUDIES?

As one of Canada's premier departments of political science, we are committed to both research and teaching. Our faculty are actively engaged in a wide range of

Program STRUCTURE

We offer three options for the Master's of Political Studies:

- MA in Political Studies: Students will complete 6 term-length courses and complete a Major Research Paper.
- MA in Political and Legal Thought:
 Students in this collaborative program will complete 4 term-length courses in the field of Political Thought (out of a total of 6 required courses) as well as complete a Major Research Paper in an area relevant to the specialization.
- MA in Political Studies with concentration in Nationalism, Ethnicity, Peace, and Conflict: Students in this concentration will complete 3 term-length courses in the area of this concentration (out of a total of 6 courses) as well as a Major Research Paper in an area relevant to this concentration.

Graduate Application FAQs

What do I need to know to APPLY?

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

- 4 year undergraduate degree in Political Science (or equivalent).
- Grade requirements: minimum B+ average.

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

If English is not a native language, prospective students must meet the English language proficiency requirements in writing, speaking, reading, and listening. The following minimum scores are required: (1) TOEFL iBT: Writing (24/30); Speaking (22/30); Reading (22/30); Listening (20/30). Applicants must have the minimum score in each test as well as the minimum overall score, or (2) IELTS: 7.0 (academic module overall band score and a 7.0 for each test band), or (3) PTE Academics: 65, or (4) CAEL CE -70 (minimum overall score).

KEY DATES & DEADLINES

- Application due: January 22nd, 2025
- Notification of acceptance: March

Before you start your application, please review the Graduate Studies application process.

What about FUNDING?

Each offer of admission guarantees a minimum level of funding for the duration of the student's period of funding-eligibility (one year for MA students). This funding typically consists of graduate awards and teaching assistantships. We encourage applicants to apply for additional funding through external scholarships, e.g. SSHRC. Incoming graduate students who win SSHRC awards are automatically provided a one time top-up award by Queens.
