STUDIES?

The MA in Global Development Studies offers a program of transformative learning that provides tools for effective and ethical global research, engagement, and collaboration. We recognise that today's graduates want to translate their academic knowledge into professional pathways that promote equitable and sustainable development and partnerships. To do so they require effective analytical and communication skills combined with a knowledge base that is global in scope. To meet this need, we offer focused classes and close supervision that in combination empowers students to address the world's complex social, political, and environmental challenges. From this foundation, our students build interdisciplinary research projects on the topics that they are most passionate about! By actively fostering the skills sought by employers in Canada and internationally, the degree enables students to open doors to careers in the fields of government and policymaking, journalism and media, social enterprise, law, and the education sector, including further research at the doctoral level.

Why QUEEN'S?

As recognised academic leaders in their fields with major international research projects, our faculty uniquely bring their active research into the classroom. They provide an enriching space for



our graduate cohorts to explore issues of political economy, cultural politics, and sustainability on a global scale. Our engaging classroom experience is combined with close supervision that provides students with the analytical tools and thematic knowledge required to conduct original research projects. At a Masters level, we offer both a oneyear degree and a two-year advanced programme involving field research. For students keen to further advance and apply their skills, we subsequently offer opportunities for advanced standing within our four year PhD programme in Global Development Studies.

This positive emphasis on cross-cultural learning and social justice helps to produce informed citizens who are uniquely positioned to craft positive social change in Canada and abroad. More broadly, at Queen's graduate students from all disciplines learn and discover in a close-knit intellectual community. With the world's best scholars, prize-winning professional development opportunities, excellent funding packages, and life in the historic waterfront city of Kingston, Queen's offers a uniquely stimulating environment for graduate studies.

Program STRUCTURE

The Masters of Global Development Studies has two streams:

The one-year course-based stream ensures the development of conceptual thinking and analytical and interpretive skills, but does not require primary research. Students will complete a Major Research Paper (MRP) of 50-60 pages, based on secondary research, dealing with a specific interdisciplinary question related to the field of development studies.

The two-year thesis-based stream culminates in a full Master's thesis of between 75-100 pages defended before a committee of three examiners. The thesis will demonstrate the student's ability

to produce original work using primary data often (but not necessarily) gathered through fieldwork.

Students do not choose between these streams before they start the program. Instead, all students are admitted into the course-based stream. Subsequently, those students interested in entering the research-based stream can apply for entry once they have begun their studies during the Fall term.

Entry into the research-based stream is dependent on having an overall average of at least A-, a clear research project, and close supervisory support from a faculty member.

Before applying, we encourage you to identify your key area(s) of research interest to make sure you are a good fit with the areas that we teach and supervise in. Domestic applicants do not need to secure a specific supervisor; however, international students must secure a supervisor prior to application due to the limited number of spaces available to international students. Please contact potential supervisors at the application stage to discuss your area of research interest and related experience and to determine if they are accepting new graduate students to supervise. Faculty profiles with their research and/or supervision interests are available on our departmental website. Once admitted, we will happily help you develop your research project and if applicable, find a suitable supervisor.

Graduate Application FAQs

What do I need to know to APPLY?

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

 A minimum B+ average in the last two years of an Honours (4-year) bachelors program in a related social science field. Students with humanities-based backgrounds or from traditionally unrelated fields may also be considered for admission if they have completed sufficient courses in social science.

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

- Academic writing sample (10-15 pages).
- International students must secure a supervisor prior to applying. For a list
 of potential supervisors, please review the DEVS faculty profiles on the <u>DEVS</u>
 website.
- If English is not a native language, prospective students must meet the English Language Proficiency Requirements in writing, speaking, reading, and listening. The following minimum scores are required: (1) TOEFL iBT: Writing (24/30); Speaking (22/30); Reading (22/30); Listening (20/30). Applicants must have the minimum score in each test as well as the minimum overall score, or (2) IELTS: 7.0 (academic module overall band score and a 7.0 for each test band), or (3) PTE Academics: 65, or (4) CAEL CE -70 (minimum overall score).
- Two academic reference letters.

KEY DATES & DEADLINES

- Application due: January 31st.
- Notification of acceptance: Mid-February and onwards.
- Late applications may be considered for domestic applicants until June 1.
 However, January 31 is the deadline to be considered for additional <u>awards</u> <u>and scholarships</u> that could supplement the minimum financial award. Please email the DEVS Academic Programs Assistant for further information if you will be submitting an application after January 31.

What about FUNDING?

The Department of Global Development Studies provides financial support for MA students enrolled in the one-year course-based program. The current minimum level of funding is \$16,000 for the academic year. Financial support is derived from a combination of internal and external awards and teaching assistantships. Equivalent funding for the second year of the thesis-based stream is not guaranteed.
