We also offer a Certificate of Competence for students not registered in a French Plan.

GET THE COURSES YOU NEED

In first year you will have the chance to explore the foundations of French Studies along with some electives.
Interested in getting a head start in learning and working in a digital world? Take [ASCX.150](#) and develop future-ready skills!

Start going deeper into the discipline of French Studies, while considering a minor and/or certificate such as [Media Studies](#). Learn more about [Certificates](#) and [Internship](#) options.
Want to make sure your academics are where you want them to be? Visit [SASS \(Student Academic Support Services\)](#) and the Writing Centre for some help.

A chance to start grouping courses in areas of interest, or to keep it more general and explore many areas of French Studies. Meet with an [Academic Advisor](#) to make sure you are on track and have planned out your courses for next year.

In fourth year you will have the chance to participate in research-based courses that can lead to [Graduate School](#) or to your future career path. Make sure to finish up all your courses for your major and your optional minor and/or certificate(s).

GET RELEVANT EXPERIENCE

Join teams or clubs on campus such as [Club Francophone](#) and [Queen's Model Parliament](#). See the [AMS Clubs Directory](#) or the [Queen's Get Involved](#) page for more ideas.

Look into summer jobs by talking to the department or Career Services about work through [SWEP](#) or [Work-Study](#).
Apply to the Department at the end of August to become a Teaching Assistant for online courses offered through Arts & Science Online (ASO).

If interested, apply for an [Undergraduate Student Summer Research Fellowship \(USSRF\)](#). Consider applying to do a 12-16 month [QUIP internship](#) after your third year. Look into employment with the federal government such as a Parliamentary Guide or a guide at a [war memorial](#) in France. Think about taking [FREN 499](#) (6.0) as a TA for FREN 150 if you are a CON-Ed student, apply in January through the Department.

Investigate requirements for full-time jobs or other opportunities related to careers of interest. Assess what experience you're lacking and fill in gaps with volunteering, clubs, or internships – check out the Career Services skills [workshop](#) for help. Consider international teaching opportunities such as teaching [English in France](#) for a year or tutoring in French.

GET ENGAGE WITH THE COMMUNITY

Volunteer on- or off-campus with different community organizations such as [Le Centre Culturel Frontenac](#) and the [Queen's International Affairs Association](#).

Get involved with the [Departmental Student Council \(DSC\)](#).
Start or continue volunteering with organizations such as [Queen's Interfaith and Intercultural Society \(QIIS\)](#).

Do targeted networking with alumni working in careers of interest by joining the LinkedIn group [Queen's Connects](#). Connect with professors at events or workshops hosted by the DSC. Develop contacts with the Kingston francophone community. Consider becoming a camp counsellor for the [French Summer Camp](#).

Join groups on LinkedIn reflecting specific careers or topics of interest in French.

GET ENGAGE GLOBALLY

Prepare for work or studies in a multi-cultural environment by taking QUIC's [Intercultural Competency Certificate](#), and research possible immigration regulations.
Speak to a QUIC advisor to get involved in their programs, events, and training opportunities.

Want to speak French abroad? Start thinking about where you would like to [study abroad](#). Apply in January for a third year exchange through the [International Programs Office](#).
Consider a one or two term exchange in France with the [Ontario-Rhône-Alpes program](#).

Build your intercultural competence by getting involved with other cultures or by practicing or improving your language skills.
Consider taking FSL through the Faculty of Education to become a teacher.

International students interested in staying in Canada can speak with an [International Student Advisor](#).

GET CAREER READY

Grappling with program decisions? Go to [Majors Night](#) or get some help [wondering about career options](#) from Career Services.

Explore different careers of interest in the Career Services Advising and Resource Area. For more information check out [Career Cruising](#) or by finding and connecting with alumni on [LinkedIn](#).

Start focusing on areas of interest. Research education requirements for careers of interest. If needed, prepare to take any required tests (like the LSAT or GMAT) and get [help thinking about grad school](#) from Career Services. Get sneak peeks of jobs posted at ACFOMI to prepare for the future.
