# Why GRADUATE STUDIES in NURSING?

Consider a graduate degree in Nursing for all it has to offer: well-developed skills in critical thinking, writing, research and, perhaps more importantly, skills to facilitate change in today's health care system. Graduate students and their work are an important part of an ongoing knowledge creation process that provides the health care system with the necessary tools to understand phenomena using various ways of knowing. Today's job market seeks people with advanced practice skills who can critically analyze information and evidence, synthesize scholarly and public reports, create new knowledge, and lead change and transformation. Study Nursing and you will acquire such skills.



The School of Nursing at Queen's offers an online PhD program. Students attend three on-campus residencies in Year 1 (September, January, and May), and complete their coursework online. This innovative program prepares graduates with analytical and research skills required to expand knowledge of clinical, theoretical, and health systems issues. Our students are taught primarily in small graduate seminars, in which they engage in a lively, critical examination of philosophy and research, and delve into their own research. Nurtured by close mentoring relationships with faculty supervisors, students engage early and continuously in research and successfully complete the program in 4 years. Situated in an academic environment that embodies scholarship, graduates are





well-prepared for careers as leaders in research and scholarship, clinical practice, and health care administration.

### Program STRUCTURE

PhD (4 years, full-time): coursework, comprehensive exam, thesis proposal, research, and final thesis examination.

# Graduate Application FAQs

# What do I need to know to APPLY?

#### ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

- Master's degree in Nursing or equivalent. Applicants without an undergraduate
  university degree in nursing will be considered on an individual basis, and are
  strongly encouraged to contact the School of Nursing to discuss this opportunity
  prior to applying.
- Grade requirements: Minimum overall average equivalent to B+.

#### ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

- Two academic letters of reference (e.g. course professors).
- Registration (or eligibility to register) as a Registered Nurse with the College of Nurses of Ontario.
- · Statement of academic, research and professional plans.
- · Copy of Curriculum Vitae (Resume)
- · Questions for Doctoral Nursing Program
- If English is not a native language, prospective students must meet the English language proficiency requirements in writing, speaking, reading, and listening. The following minimum scores are required: (1) TOEFL iBT: Writing (24/30); Speaking (22/30); Reading (22/30); Listening (20/30). Applicants must have the minimum score in each test as well as the minimum overall score, or (2) IELTS: 7.0 (academic module overall band score and a 7.0 for each test band), or (3) PTE Academics: 65, or (4) CAEL CE -70 (minimum overall score).
- Applicants are strongly encouraged to connect with potential supervisors prior
  to applying. Prospective applicants are also encouraged to Identify potential
  supervisor(s) in your application, state why you are interested in working with
  this supervisor and how working with this supervisor would be a good fit for
  yourself and your research, and briefly outline how you could contribute to this
  supervisor's current research program.

#### **KEY DATES & DEADLINES**

- Application deadline: February 1st
- Notification of acceptance: mid-March to early April.

## What about FUNDING?

In keeping with the School of Graduate Studies and Postdoctoral Affairs policy, eligible full-time Ph.D. students qualify for research assistantships (RA), teaching assistantships (TA), teaching fellowships (TF), Queen's Graduate Awards (QGA), and internal awards.

We encourage all students to apply for external funding from CIHR, OGS, SSHRC, and other sources.
