

Linguistics

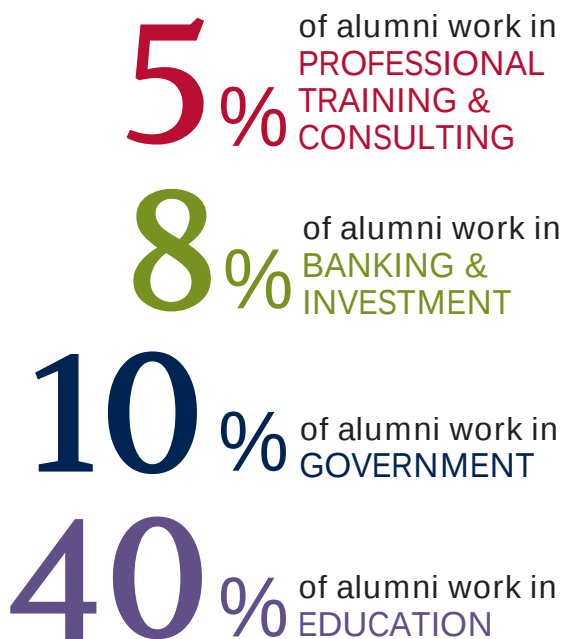
There are three aspects to Linguistics: language form, language meaning, and language in context. Linguistics is a scientific study of a language that explores the structure of language and how it is acquired. Linguistics students explore how a language is structured, how it is used in the production, comprehension of messages, and how language changes over time. You will try to answer questions relating to the nature of language, such as what do all languages have in common, or how do children learn a language? Linguistics is a highly interdisciplinary study with connections to many fields of study.

GET THE COURSES YOU NEED

In first year you start with the two Introduction to Linguistics courses - LING 101: Words, Sentences, and Meaning, and LING 102: Sounds, Signs, and Perception.

GET RELEVANT EXPERIENCE

Join teams or clubs on campus such as **Best Buddies**, **Queen's Students for Literacy**, or **Queen's Health Outreach**.

See the **AMS Clubs Directory** page for more ideas. Join the **English Conversation Program (QUIC)**.

GET ENGAGED WITH THE COMMUNITY

Volunteer on- or off-campus with different community organizations like the **Providence Care Volunteer Program** or **Teachers of English as a Second Language in Kingston and Area**.

GET ENGAGED GLOBALLY

Take LLCU 111: Introduction to Cultures. Prepare for work or studies in a multi-cultural environment.

Volunteer with QUIC for the English Conversation program, planning social events and in the Intercultural Wellness Leaders Program.

GET CAREER READY

Grappling with program decisions? Go to **Majors Night** or get some help exploring career options from Career Services.

Build your transferable skills in time management, problem-solving, writing, and more with **Student Academic Success Services**.

Start taking core courses at the 200-level (choose from LING 202, LINGS 205, and LLCU 200), 300-level (LING 320, LING 330, LING 340) and 400-level (LING 415). Look into plan selection for doing a minor and/or certificate. Learn more about **Certificates** and **Internship** options.

Look into summer jobs by talking to the department or **Career Services** about work through **SWEP**, **Work-Integrated Learning** or **Work-Study**. Consider entrepreneurial opportunities via programs like the **Queen's Founders and Innovators Initiative (QFI)**.

Get involved with the Departmental Student Council (DSC). Go to cultural events such as LLCU Film Nights, Language Clubs, guest lectures, and **Four Directions Indigenous Centre programming**. Connect with the **Canadian Linguistic Association**. Volunteer with organizations such as **Teachers of English as a Second Language in Kingston and Area**, or **Kingston Literacy & Skills**.

Want to immerse yourself in your language of study? Start thinking about where you would like to **study abroad**. Apply in January for a third year exchange through the **International Programs Office**.

Explore different careers of interest in the **Career Services Information Area**. For more information check out **Career Cruising** or find and connect with alumni on LinkedIn.

Discover what skills you already have and figure out what ones you want to grow by using the **Queen's Skills Cards**.

Finish core courses at the 200- and 300-levels, and continue taking option courses such as LLCU 370. Complete the language requirement and continue taking option courses such as LLCU 110 and LLCU 200. Meet with a Department of LLCU **Academic Advisor** to make sure you are on track and have planned out your courses for next year - for some ideas, see the back page.

If interested, apply for an **Undergraduate Student Summer Research Fellowship (USSRF)**.

Consider applying to do a **QUIP internship** between your third and fourth year.

If interested, apply to be a **Teaching Assistant in Linguistics**.

Do targeted networking with alumni working in careers of interest through LinkedIn.

Consider participating at a conference such as at **Toronto Undergraduate Linguistics Conference**.

Build your intercultural competence by getting involved with other cultures or by practicing or improving your **language skills**. Join an **intercultural club** and/or go to **Quic social events**.

Start focusing on areas of interest. Research education requirements for careers of interest. If needed, prepare to take any required tests (like the LSAT or GMAT) and get **help thinking about Grad School** from Career Services.

Complete at least one other LING course at the 400-level or above. Ensure you finish up all your courses for your major and your optional minor and/or certificate(s).

You will have the chance to participate in research-based courses that can lead to Graduate School or to your future career path.

With more room consider taking elective such as **ASCX 150** to develop future-ready skills!

Investigate requirements for full-time jobs or other opportunities related to careers of interest such as participating in a conference such as **Inquiry@Queen's**. Assess what experience you're lacking and fill in gaps with volunteering, clubs, or internships – check out the Career Services skills **workshop** for help.

Consider joining professional associations like the **Speech-Language & Audiology Canada**, or the **Canadian Linguistics Association**.

Start thinking about work or further studies abroad, such as **North American Language and Culture Assistants** in Spain or **Foreign Language Assistant** in Germany.

Apply to jobs or future education, or make plans for other adventures. Get help from **Career Services** with job searching, resumes, interviews, Grad School applications, or other decisions.

Find impactful work that aligns with your values using the **Queen's Career Guide to the UN Sustainable Development Goals**.

A degree in Linguistics can equip you with:

- Knowledge of nuances of morphology, syntax, phonetics, phonology, and semantics of English and foreign languages
- Ability to develop and test scientific hypotheses
- Ability to investigate, analyze, critically question and discover testability, falsifiability, and predictability of data
- Ability to identify, analyze, and evaluate unfamiliar language data
- Ability to synthesize research findings and construct a readable, well supported research report
- Awareness of rigorous method and attention to detail required in collecting and recording data
- Knowledge on how language influences the way in which we interact with each other and think about the world
- Ability to work in groups
- Resource and time management working on multiple projects

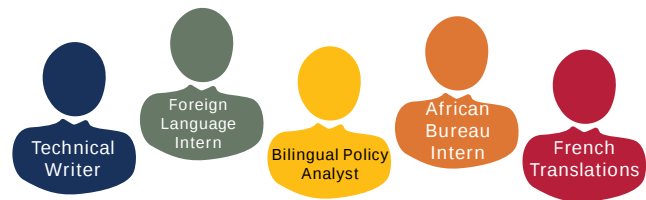
ELIGIBILITY
