Indigenous Studies

The Major in Indigenous Studies is an interdisciplinary degree that draws together a range of course offerings on Indigenous histories, cultures, experiences, languages, and ways of knowing from across Arts and Science. The program gives Indigenous and non-Indigenous students an opportunity to immerse themselves in Indigenous ways of knowing and being in the world to ensure that future leaders and policymakers have a grounded understanding of the lived realities of First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Peoples. Students expand their knowledge and understanding of Indigenous cultures, while developing professional skills, such as innovative Indigenous approaches to learning and research, to work with Indigenous communities.

Become knowledgeable on the lived histories of Indigenous peoples in Canada and beyond and contribute to the ongoing work of reconciliation.

Learn Indigenous languages at the beginner level.

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Develop skills to work with Indigenous knowledge systems and methodologies, framed by Indigenous pedagogies and learning practices.

Get out on the land to learn from our first teacher and engage with local Indigenous knowledge keepers and communities.

Choose from a variety of interdisciplinary courses from the humanities, social sciences, and beyond to broaden your worldview and strengthen your critical thinking skills.


