Consider applying to do a 12-16 month [QUIP Internship](#) between your third and fourth year.

Build on your learning in DEVS 250: "Environmental Transformations" by volunteering at [Sustainable Kingston](#).

Engage in targeted networking with alumni working in careers of interest by joining the LinkedIn group [Queen's Connects](#). Check out Career Services [networking workshops](#).

Connect with professors at events or workshops hosted by the DSC.

Develop your intercultural competence by getting involved with other cultures or by practicing or improving your language skills.

Be eligible for courses during the fall semester [Canadian University in Shanghai, China](#). Take the required prerequisite course of DEVS 363 if you are interested in an exchange to WITS University in South Africa. Apply for [DEVS 307](#) (Living in Havana) in October.

Start focusing on areas of interest. Research education requirements for careers of interest. If needed, prepare to take any required tests (like the LSAT or GRE) and get [help thinking about Graduate School](#) from Career Services. Explore [international scholarship opportunities](#) for graduate studies.

4TH YEAR

In fourth year you will have the chance to participate in research-based courses that can lead to [Graduate School](#) or to your future career path.

Run your academic advisement report (AAR) on SOLUS to ensure you have met your degree requirements.

Interested in working on a real-world problem with an actual client? Take [ASCX 400](#) and develop your consulting and project-management skills.

Publish your work with peer-reviewed journals like [The Observer](#) or [Politicus](#).

Investigate requirements for full-time jobs or other opportunities related to careers of interest such as OceanPath Fellowship or Aga Khan Youth Internship. Assess what experience you're lacking and fill in gaps with volunteering, clubs, or internships – check out the Career Services skills [workshop](#) for help.

Consider joining professional associations like [Canadian Association for the Study of International Development](#) and the [Canadian Association for Global Health](#).

Join groups on LinkedIn reflecting specific careers or topics of interest in Global Development.
