The undergraduate program in Gender Studies at Queen's offers courses in feminist, anti-racist, Indigenous, postcolonial, queer, transgender, and social justice studies. Students learn about the histories of different forms of oppression, engage with popular culture, and critically analyze everyday events. From research papers and blogs, to presentations and creative productions, students work on meticulous research, clear and thoughtful writing, creative expression, and public speaking. Our courses span the arts and social sciences to produce a truly interdisciplinary program, one that prepares students for a broad range of careers.

1ST YEAR

GET THE COURSES YOU NEED

In first year you'll have the chance to explore the foundations of Gender Studies along with some electives.

GET RELEVANT EXPERIENCE

GET CONNECTED WITH THE COMMUNITY

Volunteer on or off-campus with different community organizations such as the [Levana Gender Advocacy Centre](#), [Sexual Assault Centre Kingston](#), [Pathways to Education Kingston](#), [Dress for Success](#), [ReelOut Film Festival](#), [Roots and Wings Kingston](#), [Modern Fuel](#) and [Queen's InvisAbilities](#).

GET THINKING GLOBALLY

Prepare for work or studies in a multi-cultural environment by taking [QUIC's Intercultural Awareness Certificate](#), and research possible immigration regulations.

Speak to a QUIC advisor to get involved in their programs, events, and training opportunities.

GET READY FOR LIFE AFTER GRADUATION

Grappling with program decisions? Go to [Majors Night](#) or get some help with career options from Career Services.

2ND YEAR

Delve deeper into the Gender Studies, while considering a minor to compliment your studies. Look into the [Sexual and Gender Diversity](#) certificate program to add a specialization in sexual/gender diversity to your degree. Attend [Degree +](#) in the Fall term to learn more about [Certificates](#) and [Internship](#) options.

Look into [summer jobs](#) by talking to the department or Career Services about work through [SWEP](#) or [Work-Study](#).

Take more responsibility within different clubs or extracurriculars. Volunteer at organizations like the [AMS Peer Support Centre](#).

Get involved with the Departmental Student Council (DSC).

Start or continue volunteering with organizations such as [Queen's Advocates for Women's Global Rights](#). Continue volunteer and social justice work on and off campus.

Is an exchange in your future? Start thinking about where you would like to [study abroad](#). Apply in January for a third year exchange through [the International Programs Office](#).

Gender Studies offers a [special exchange program at the University of Oslo](#).

3RD YEAR

A chance to start grouping courses in areas of interest, or to keep it more general and explore many areas of Gender Studies. Meet with an [Academic Advisor](#) to make sure you are on track and have planned out your courses for next year.

If interested, apply for an [Undergraduate Student Summer Research Fellowship \(USSRF\)](#).

Consider applying to do a 12-16 month [QUIP internship](#) between your third and fourth year or consider entrepreneurial opportunities via programs like the [Queen's Innovation](#)

Do targeted networking with alumni working in careers of interest by joining the LinkedIn group [Queen's Connects](#). Check out Career Services [networking workshops](#).

Connect with professors at events or workshops hosted by the DSC.

Build your intercultural competence by getting involved with other cultures or by practicing or improving your language skills.

Start focusing on areas of interest. Research education requirements for careers of interest. If needed, prepare to take any required tests (like the LSAT, MCAT or GMAT) and get [help thinking about Grad School](#) from Career Services.

4TH OR FINAL YEAR

In fourth year you will have the chance to participate in research-based courses that can lead to [Graduate School](#) or to your future career path. Make sure to finish up all your courses for your major and your optional minor and/or certificate(s).

Look for positions in non-profit organizations through [Charity Village](#).

Investigate requirements for full-time jobs or other opportunities related to careers of interest. Assess what experience you're lacking and fill in gaps with volunteering, clubs, or internships – check out the Career Services skills [workshop](#) for help.

Consider joining professional associations like the [Canadian Federation for the Humanities and Social Sciences](#) and the [Canadian Research Institute for the Advancement of Women](#).

Join groups on LinkedIn reflecting specific careers or topics of interest in Gender

Apply to jobs or future education, or make plans for other adventures. What will I learn?

A degree in Gender Studies can equip you with:

- Understanding how gender is linked with experiences of race, Indigeneity, nation, sexuality, class, and ability.
- Knowledge and tools to identify and challenge structures of power and oppression.
- Skills to engage with creative texts, films, performance, and art.
- Active rather than passive responses to popular culture.
- Mixed methodologies combining the arts, social sciences, and health sciences.
- Analytical skills to form and defend positions with clarity and accuracy in diverse formats.
- Critical thinking skills to recognize and assess the assumptions behind arguments.
