GET THE COURSES YOU NEED

1st year: Start with SPAN 111/3.0: Beginning Spanish I and SPAN 112/3.0 Beginning Spanish II.

2nd year: Continue with Spanish language classes: Take SPAN 204/3.0, SPAN 205/3.0 and SPAN 206/3.0. Consider taking LLCU 247/3.0 Dynamic History of Spain and LLCU 248/3.0: Latin American cultural contexts. Consider studying abroad in your 3rd year.

3rd year: take SPAN 301/3.0 and SPAN 302/3.0. Start taking courses on literature: SPAN 351/3.0, SPAN 380/3.0, SPAN 381/3.0. Add more SPAN courses at 300-level.

4th year: Complete SPAN option courses at 300 level. You may choose up to 6.0 units of option courses in English such as LLCU 111/3.0, LLCU 244/3.0, or LLCU 249/3.0.

GET THE COURSES YOU NEED

2nd year: Choose from hundreds of option courses, including many LLCU courses at 200-level. Continue with the language course and pick up another language. Consider study abroad in your 3rd year.

3rd year: Take LLCU 303/3.0: Applied Intercultural Communication to complete your core courses. Finish language requirement. Choose option courses at 300-level.

4th year: Complete option courses at 300 level.

WHY STUDY LINGUISTICS AT QUEEN'S?

Linguistics is the study of language and its structure, including the study of morphology, syntax, phonetics, phonology and semantics. Linguistics students explore how a language is structured, how it is acquired, how it is used in the production and comprehension of messages, how it changes over time. They will try to answer questions relating to the nature of language such as what all languages have in common or how children learn a language. Because language accompanies almost all human activities, and is the medium for many of them, Linguistics is a highly interdisciplinary study with connections to Philosophy, Psychology, Computer Science, Cognitive Science or Health Sciences.
